WORKSHOP SESSION ONE (12:45 P.M. - 1:45 P.M.)

Session A: Engaging Males in Service

Presentation #1: Where are the Men in Service: A Community-Based Research Project

Jason Radford, Appalachian State University

The research that will be presented focuses on the results of survey data done on college students to explain why there are very few college men in on-campus service-coordination offices. Suggestions on how to recruit more men into service programs will be made based on the research. There will also be a reflection on the research as a community-based research project with suggestions about how to perform this type of research.

A senior at Appalachian State University from Henderson, NC, Jason Radford has been working for a year with the ASU Appalachian and Community Together office to find out why men are not volunteering in the ACT office.

Presentation #2: The Y Factor: Practical Applications for Recruiting Male Volunteers Jessica Gagne and Shawn Moore, East Carolina University

Are you repeatedly asking yourself, "where are the men?" Based on conversations with active male volunteers, this presentation will cover the do's and don't's of attracting men to service activities. We'll highlight successful techniques to create, market and organize male friendly opportunities that you can easily transfer to your campus!

Session A: Student Entrepreneurship Programs Presentation #1: APPLES Service Entrepreneurship Programs Ashley Murray, UNC–Chapel Hill

Since its creation in 1999, APPLES Social Entrepreneur Fellowships at UNC-Chapel Hill have helped almost 40 undergraduates in funding and implementing their ideas for a social enterprise. This program nurtures student ideas and mentors social entrepreneurs to assist them in being successful in their pursuit of creating and sustaining positive change. Alliances with faculty, professional development seminars and monthly reflections, course credit in addition to funding are resources provided to all Fellows. Presentation #2: UNC Entrepreneurial Public Service Fellowships: Supporting National and International Social Entrepreneurship

Eileen Hannan, UNC-Chapel Hill

The UNC Entrepreneurial Public Service (EPS) Fellowship is a summer fellows program of the Carolina Center for Public Service at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. For the past two years, fellowships of up to \$3,000 have been awarded to students to develop and/or implement summer projects that employ innovative, sustainable approaches to complex social needs. The projects address identifiable needs nationally and internationally, and each Fellow plans and works on his/her project with a community partner as well as a faculty mentor who is familiar with the Fellow's topic and/or the geographic area.

This presentation will provide an overview of the structure and selection process for the fellowship program as well as concrete examples of past and current Fellows' work.

Session B: Cultivating Social Capital to Unite "Us" and "Them": Inspiring Mentorship of Children with Disabilities by College Students

Jonathan Barry, Wake Forest University ('07)

This presentation will cover important information for community-service and service-learning directors to develop and cultivate a sustainable HOPE Service Chapter at their respective colleges for the mutual benefit of both their college students and area's children with disabilities. Topics include establishing a campus disability service network, encouraging their students to mentor students with disabilities, and acquiring proper disability etiquette and people-first language skills when interacting with people with disabilities.

Leslie Boney III, UNC System

Leslie Boney serves as Associate Vice President for Economic Development Research, Policy and Planning. His duties include serving as key staff support to the President on economic development issues. He is principally responsible for conducting research and analysis in the support of the university's economic development strategy, for coordinating system-wide economic development initiatives with selected faculty and University personnel and for connecting this work to external constituencies. A primary role is to coordinate UNC's efforts to enhance entrepreneurship on campus and throughout the state.

He currently serves as Governor Easley's appointee to the Southern Growth Policies Board, as the University's representative on the N.C. Economic Development Board and the board of the NC Biotechnology Center and on the North Carolina Food Bank Advisory Council.
